I have made survey of twelve foot alley west of Oak Avenue from Summit Street north to second alley, as referred to me by yourself, and have the following report to make.

The lots upon the east side of alley all but one are encroaching upon the alley as follows: first lot north of Summit Street, #1702, has concrete walk 0.3 upon alley, second lot #1791, fence and coal house 2 1/2 ft. upon alley, third lot, 1698, fence 2.0 ft upon alley, fourth lot, 1697, barn and fence on alley 2 1/2 ft, fifth lot, #1695, house on rear O.K., sixth lot, 1692, fence 2 1/2 ft. on alley,
